

Watson's men were the superstars of their day, and included heroic captain Alex Raisbeck and lethal marksman Sam Raybould, not to mention the incomparable Matt McQueen, a future title-winning manager in his own right. *Red Dawn* is Jeff Goulding and Kieran Smith's second collaboration, and like their previous title, *The Untouchables: Anfield's Band of Brothers*, the book sheds new light on a previously unheralded period in the club's history.
